



# Can you hose down solar panels

Should a hose be removed before solar panel cleaning?

If a hose has a high-pressure attachment, it will need to be removed before solar panel cleaning. The key to this step is careful, deliberate spraying along each solar panel. If a garden hose doesn't allow for enough spraying control, a telescopic hose wand may help. This will have a more supportive grip than a hose on its own.

How do you clean solar panels with water?

When cleaning your panels with water, use a standard garden hose and soapy water. You don't need to purchase any particular cleaning solution to clean your panels; regular dish soap will work perfectly. Avoid any strong cleaning agents like bleach that could damage your panels.

Take a soft brush and scrub panels, make sure if there's built up dirt at the bottom of the panel, that you clear that. Hose down the panels again so all the loose dirt gets rinsed. Finish with distilled water or ion-less water so when it dries, it doesn't leave the minerals in tap water behind.
