Is Lorde's 'solar power' a good album?

Lorde's wonderful third album, *Solar Power*, is too complex to be basic. But it does shrug off the baggage that has been placed upon Lorde, upon stardom, and upon happiness itself in the influencer age. Gone are the creepy keyboards and the image of a teen girl with hunched posture in black cloaks.

What does Lorde do on solar power?

On *Solar Power*, Lorde surrenders to normalcy--and finds transcendence. Ever since people started slinging around the word basic as an insult, delights as disparate as pumpkin-spice lattes, the music of Lizzo, and sunsets have gotten a bad rap. The diss refers to pleasure--simple pleasures, normal pleasures, things that everyone can enjoy.

Why does Lorde's 'solar power' not wow?

Lorde's prioritization of private pleasure over the duties of pop stardom helps explain the parts of *Solar Power* that don't wow: a clutch of ballads written with such memoirist precision, and such disinterest in big catharsis, that they may exist more for her sake than the listener's. Yet even the duller fare makes a point.

Is Lorde sharper than he is in solar power?

Lorde the musician, social critic, and diarist has never been sharper, thankfully. As *Solar Power* meditates on the tension between achievement and comfort, it grazes masterpiece status--the only thing holding it back may be Lorde's disinterest in chasing accolades.

Is Lorde right on time?

Nothing moves up a quarter-life crisis quite like a global climate catastrophe and a pandemic, so Lorde's is right on time. With *Solar Power*, she's right in the thick of it: wearied by teenage fame and capitalism, worried about the state of the earth and grieving the loss of her beloved dog Pearl.

Is solar power a good album?

Solar Power largely meanders through the anxiety, a bit of a relatable smooth brain approach to all that's going on in the world. Lorde admits as much on the album: she basks in the inconclusiveness of her deep thoughts.

"*Solar Power*" is a quietly but supremely confident return. At one point, Lorde adopts the role of a seaside piper, calling on her shoreline neighbours to gather round and listen ...

Lorde makes similar promises on "*Solar Power*," which she recorded primarily with producer Jack Antonoff, pop's premier facilitator of VIP ambivalence: "Goodbye to all the bottles, all the ...
