

The process is similar to a pumped-storage hydropower plant (HPP), with water substituted with concrete blocks and gravity doing the rest. The energy storage technology has been invented by a Swiss-based startup called Energy Vault, which recently received a USD 110 million investment from Softbank Group. Why storage?

Using proprietary software, the towering structure orchestrates the placement of 35-ton blocks of concrete in response to drop-offs in demand and fluctuations in environmental ...

So raising the temperature of a block of concrete by 1 K (i.e., 1 °C) stores as much energy as raising it just over 100 metres. (Some calculations I did a while ago showed store energy for heat in a lead acid battery would have a higher capacity if you just heated them up to about 80 °C (IIRC) rather than charge them.)

A third approach utilises gravity energy storage. Concrete blocks weighing up to 35 metric tonnes are lifted using excess electricity to store energy as gravitational potential energy.

Swiss startup Energy Vault came out of stealth mode in 2018, and has been on an upward trajectory since then. The company created a system to store electricity by elevating concrete blocks, and investors quickly jumped on board: Energy Vault raised \$110 million from the SoftBank Vision Fund in 2019, and another \$100



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million led by Prime Movers Lab in 2021.

The trouble is the world needs to add a lot more energy storage, if we are to continue to add the intermittent solar and wind power necessary to cut our dependence on fossil fuels. A startup called Energy Vault thinks it has a viable alternative to pumped-hydro: Instead of using water and dams, the startup uses concrete blocks and cranes.

The cranes that lift and lower the blocks have six arms, and they're controlled by fully-automated custom software. Compressed air energy storage has been advocated by many for many years. The first storage plant was built in 1978 and has successfully operated for decades. However, it still only accounts for a tiny fraction of total energy storage, and has seen several startups fail after millions of dollars of investment, even as new startups continue to ...

Storworks has constructed a 10MWhe, first of its kind concrete energy storage demonstration facility at Southern Company's Gaston coal-fired generating plant. The project was funded by the DOE, EPRI (Electric Power Research Institute), and other industry partners to prove the performance of Storworks' BolderBloc technology.

Swiss start-up Energy Vault is providing a solution by storing extra energy as potential energy in concrete blocks. Their innovative energy storage technology consists of a combination of 35 tons solid concrete blocks and a tall tower. The 120-meter (nearly 400-foot) tall, six-armed crane lifts the blocks 35 stories high into the air when there ...

Energy Vault has created a new storage system in which a six-arm crane sits atop a 33-storey tower, raising and lowering concrete blocks and storing energy in a similar method to pumped hydropower stations. How does the process compare to other forms of energy storage, such as batteries and pumped-storage hydro?

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
